In its 46 years of awarding Fellowships (1975 - 2021), the O'Brien Foundation has received **2,445** applications and granted **363 fellowships**. This year also marks the 10th award of a fellowship made possible by our generous Alumni. This year's awards amounted to \$75,000, and the cumulative total awarded over the years is close to two million: **\$1,922,000**. This financial assistance often comes at a time when it's most needed, and recipients deeply appreciate it. We are exceptionally proud of all O'Brien Fellows and their accomplishments!

#### Mathieu Martin

#### Université du Québec à Montréal

Mathieu is originally from Edmundston, NB. He began his bachelor's degree in 2015 at the Université de Moncton - Edmundston campus, where he served as president of the student association in 2017-2018. After completing his Bachelor of Arts (Individualized Studies) in 2019, he earned a Master of Arts in History from Université de Moncton (2021) and in September began his doctoral studies in history at the Université du Québec à Montréal.

Mathieu's academic interests span the history of religion, Acadian studies, and women's history. His doctoral dissertation combines these themes by examining the Christian women's movement in Acadia during the second half of the 20th century. Through his research, Mathieu wants to illuminate Acadian women's contributions within the historical context of the region.





Proud of his origins, Mathieu has presented conference papers and published several articles on the history of Madawaska. He's a firm believer in the importance of transmitting knowledge and would like to return to teach history in New Brunswick once he has completed his doctoral studies.


### Ian Baird

After establishing and growing a national university research network, <a href="Mitacs">Mitacs</a>, throughout Atlantic Canada, lan returned to graduate studies to pursue his lifelong passion for History.

Having completed his Master's in 2018, he is now in the third year of his PhD research in History, diving deep into the spiritual lives of Canadians during the Great War. His work considers the complex ways in which Canadians coped with death and bereavement at battle fronts and home fronts, particularly in armed forces communities. Ian has two sons, one of

Université de Moncton

Chloé was born and raised in Moncton, NB, and is currently a Master's candidate in Biology at the Université de Moncton. She has always had a passion for the natural world and the variety of species that inhabit it.



Since the beginning of her undergraduate degree, she has had the opportunity to do molecular laboratory work as well as field work with salmonids. Under the supervision of Dr. Simon Lamarre and Dr. Suzie Currie, she is now studying how sociality (whether an animal is with other animals or not) influences the response of fish to warm temperatures.

Chloé's experimental model, the mangrove killi, is a perfect example of the wonders of the natural world - it can reproduce on its own and is able to survive for several weeks on land! Understanding more about the relationship between temperature and physiology will help predict how species respond to climate change. As she advances in these endeavours and continues having her work recognized, Chloé hopes to have a career that will allow her to continue researching aquatic organisms and ultimately contribute to more effective conservation rules.

### Nicolas Richard

#### Rice University

Nicolas is pursuing his Master of Music at Rice University's Shepherd School of Music under the tutelage of Benjamin Kamins. Originally from Fredericton, Nicolas credits his early teachers, including Richard Hoenich, Kristin Day, and Yvonne Kershaw, as important influences on his musical development and the significant achievements that have led him to a promising career in music.

In 2019, Nicolas was appointed Principal Bassoon of the Niagara Symphony Orchestra, a position he won while completing his undergraduate degree and studying with distinguished woodwinds artist Christopher Millard at the University of Ottawa. Nicolas has performed regularly with the National Arts Centre Orchestra and with symphony orchestras in Windsor, Kingston, and Ottawa. Beyond the orchestral experience, Nicolas has appeared as a soloist with the National Arts Centre Orchestra and the University of Ottawa Orchestra. Nicolas won the second prize in the 2020 OSM (Orchestre Symphonique de Montréal) Competition and is first prize winner of the National Arts Centre Orchestra Bursary Competition, the Ottawa Symphony's Sénécal-Mozart Prize, and the University of Ottawa's Concerto Competition.

### Allen Chase

#### University of New Brunswick



In addition to working on his Ph.D. in Educational Studies, Allen is employed as a middle school teacher in Fredericton, among other endeavours, and his research interests include critical pedagogy, school culture, teachers' professional praxis, and ethical and social justice issues in education. Allen's doctoral work aims at documenting New Brunswick's teachers' experience in the COVID-19 (and hopefully post-COVID) era by examining neoliberal educational policies and practice. Allen's research is supported in part by the New Brunswick Innovation Foundation (NBIF) and a Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada (SSHRC) project in conjunction with his doctoral supervisor, Dr. Matt Rogers.

Allen holds a Master of Arts in Political Science from UNB and a Master of Library and Information Science from the University of Western Ontario, specializations that have brought him opportunities to work with educators in New Brunswick and abroad. It was the division between school libraries and teaching in his career that fostered Allen's interest in social justice and equity

issues faced by teachers.

## Sandrine Duval

McGill University



Sandrine hails from Edmundston and is currently working towards her PhD in French language and literature at McGill University. Her research examines the emergence of women in Canadian francophone theater, focusing specifically on the affirmation of identity among women authors who are doubly minoritized because of gender and their evolution in a minority francophone environment.

As an undergraduate at Université de Moncton's Edmundston campus, Sandrine was recognized with two awards for community involvement, Personality of the Year and the Citizen Engagement Award.

After earning her bachelor's degree (2019), she began her Master's in literary studies at the Université de Moncton, where her thesis examined the hybridization of storytelling and monologue in Acadian playwriting of the 2010s. In addition to receiving research assistantships, she published artistic critiques for the web-zine *Astheure* and the journal *Liaison*.

Sandrine's doctoral research aims to continue illuminating the work of women whose theatrical

contributions are too often in the shadows, and she is pleased to be the recipient of a 2021 O'Brien Fellowship.

## Richard Yeomans

#### University of New Brunswick

Richard Yeomans is a PhD candidate in the Department of History at the University of New Brunswick. His dissertation examines the role of scientific knowledge in New Brunswick's development after the American Revolution and arrival of loyalist refugees, until Confederation in 1867. It shows how the provincial Assembly regulated the province's finite resources, such that New Brunswickers created a knowledge commons in order to disseminate information about agriculture, fisheries and timber, and were more motivated to manage the environment than other settler colonies in the pre-Confederation era.

Originally from Fredericton, Richard earned his BA in history from UNB and his MA from Queen's University.





Since his return to NB he has published papers on settler science and actively participates in academic organizations such as UNB's Atlantic Canada Studies Centre, with whom he is developing a documentary on environmental change in the lower Bay of Fundy and Grand Manan. Richard is co-creator and editor of the New Brunswick Storytellers book project, a forthcoming collection of micro-histories about New Brunswick's pre-Confederation past, and is the recipient of several awards including a Social Sciences and Humanities Council of Canada doctoral fellowship and a 2021 O'Brien Fellowship.

## Ahmed Eldesoky

#### **Dalhousie University**

Ahmed is a PhD Candidate in Chemistry at Dalhousie University who holds a Vanier Canada Graduate Scholarship and Killam doctoral fellowship for his research on Lithium-ion and Lithium-metal batteries. He is finding ways to improve these batteries' lifetime capabilities to meet the demands of grid energy storage and electric vehicles.

Ahmed earned his Bachelor of Science with Honours in Chemistry from the University of New Brunswick. While at UNB, his interests had fluctuated from salmon research to healthcare, until he received an NSERC Undergraduate Student Research Award to work with Professor Jeff Dahn at Dalhousie on renewable energy and Li-ion battery research.

Continuing in this field for the last two years of his bachelor's degree, Ahmed went on to complete industry internships at Tesla in California and





Bayerische Motoren Werke AG--better known as *BMW*--in Munich.

In addition to his research, Ahmed enjoys being outdoors, travelling (when that was possible) and cooking. Ahmed has been awarded an O'Brien Fellowship and the O'Brien Alumni award for 2021.





In 1971 (fifty years ago), J. Leonard O'Brien created the Leonard & Kathleen O'Brien Humanitarian Trust to award postgraduate Fellowships as a means of helping New Brunswickers achieve their educational goals. The first awards were made in 1975, and nearly \$2 million in support has helped deserving and distinguished recipients ever since. A short video commemorating LeonardO'Brien's life and legacy was proposed by Board members Deborah Robichaud (1976) and Richard Hornsby early in 2021, and production began in May. It's anticipated that the video will premiere in 2022.

Spoiler alert! The video includes footage from some of Leonard O'Brien's own documentary films and features several of the Foundation's actors, including Gordon Thomson (Chair Emeritus) and Dr. Carmen Poulin (former Board chair). Some other familiar faces appear in it too.



- ★ Half a century ago, J. Gordon Thomson, CA, witnessed as Leonard O'Brien signed the Trust Agreement setting it all in motion, and ever since then has traveled from Calgary (AB) or Cape Breton (NS) whenever an O'Brien Foundation event or commitment calls for his attendance.
- ★ G.Brian Trenholm, CPA, CA has steered the Foundation through peaks and troughs of "the Accountant-Sea" for nearly two decades. He keeps the Foundation afloat and on course, ensuring it never runs aground.
- ★ Dr. John Tivendell initially served on the Selection Committee, retired as a full Professor of Psychology from the Université de Moncton a few years ago, and continues to serve reassuringly as chair of the Board.
- ★ O'Brien Fellow Deborah Robichaud (1976) gave back to the Foundation long after receiving her fellowship. Following a successful career in public service, Deborah served on the Board for nearly a decade before stepping down last June. As a driving force behind the "Capturing our History" video project, she'll continue shepherding it through to completion. The O'Brien Foundation has benefited enormously from Deborah's many contributions over the years.
- ★ Dr. Edmund Biden started out as a Rhodes Scholar, established the Institute of Bio-Engineering at UNB and was Dean of UNB's School of Graduate Studies when he joined the Board in 2011. He and former Selection committee member

Richard Hornsby (Director of Music, UNB) have about a quarter-century of service between them. Will the Board's most recent members, Dr. Enrico diTomasso and Dr. Alan Sears, match that record? Time will tell.
